Programming and Activities
















January

- 30 Collaborated with Chard Métis Nation to host a Community Poker Rally.






Farewell and 11-year celebration for outgoing manager Jessica Janvier.



Continue prioritizing the safety and wellbeing of children, youth and families through consistent care, supervision and inclusive programming.


Broaden Access to Sports and Recreation
